

What Are Possessive Apostrophes?

An apostrophe is a small dash punctuation mark that is placed above the letters in a word when you are either contracting two words (such as "I am" to "I'm") or when you are showing possession.


A possessive apostrophe shows ownership or belonging.

For example:

Tara's room - the room belongs to Tara

The dog's bone - the bone belongs to the dog

Singular Possessive Apostrophes



For example:

The pen belonging to Matthew was on the desk.

Matthew's pen was on the desk.

The branches belonging to the tree swayed in the wind.

The tree's branches swayed in the wind.

Singular Possessive Apostrophes



When nouns already end in a letter **s**, you need to add an apostrophe and an additional **s**.

The football belonging to Thomas had a puncture in it.

Thomas's football had a puncture in it.

The tentacle belonging to the octopus was wrapped around the shell.

The octopus's tentacle was wrapped around the shell.

Plural Possessive Apostrophes

However, not all plural nouns end in **s**. Some plural nouns are irregular, e.g. children, people, mice.

In cases such as these, add an apostrophe and an s to the end of the word.

we put extra blankets in the bea belonging to the pupples.

Ma nut avtra blankate in the nunnice' had

The coats belonging to the children were wet from the rain.

The children's coats were wet from the rain.
